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Stay Safe on TikTok

TikTok is a video-sharing app that is huge with children and teenagers right now. You lip-sync to music or do comedy sketches, and can add effects to your videos. You can also gain followers ('fans') and watch other people's videos. The age recommendation is 13 and above, but it is easy for younger children to sign up too.

What are the main things to watch out for?

- Sexual lyrics and swearing in songs
- Content about eating disorders (known as 'pro-ana') and bullying content
- 'Challenges' that users take part in that are potentially dangerous
- Emojis that are seen as sexually suggestive, like the aubergine
- Under-16s cannot send or receive private messages. But once users have made contact, like through comments on videos, they could still switch to another app like Snapchat to chat privately and swap images and videos.



7 steps to keep your child safe

- 1. Use family pairing (also known as family safety mode)
- 2. Keep account set to private and limit profile information
- 3. Set age limits so your child does not see inappropriate content
- 4. Consider setting a time limit on use
- 5. Restrict in-app purchases to block spending
- 6. Check settings on interactions like duets, direct messages and comments
- 7. Make sure your child knows how to report content and users
